


SILVER CREEK PRESERVE

WATERFOWL HUNTING REGULATIONS (No other hunting is permitted)

NOTE: FAILURE TO ABIDE BY THESE REGULATIONS MAY RESULT IN TRESPASSING CHARGES AS PER IDAHO CODE §36-1603. IT IS UNLAWFUL TO HUNT ON PRIVATE LANDS <u>WITHOUT PERMISSION</u>. THE NATURE CONSERVANCY GRANTS PERMISSION ONLY TO THOSE HUNTERS THAT ABIDE BY THE FOLLOWING:

- 1. Hunting is allowed on Wednesdays, Saturdays, and Sundays only, during shooting hours see Idaho Fish & Game Hunting Regulations for specific times.
- 2. You must sign in at the Kilpatrick Bridge kiosk **BEFORE** entering the preserve to hunt. This secures your right to trespass for retrieving waterfowl.
- 3. Hunter access at the Preserve is allowed by **BOAT/CANOE ONLY**. Boat access points are located at the Kilpatrick and Stalker Creek bridges.
- 4. Hunting on foot or jump shooting is prohibited.
- 5. **YOU CANNOT WALK ON PRESERVE PROPERTY WITH YOUR GUN**. When retrieving waterfowl, hunters must leave their guns at their boats.
- 6. Shooting is allowed only from within the high-water lines and/or the immediate shoreline of creeks and islands **outside the posted NO HUNTING ZONES. See map next page.**
- 7. Sullivan Lake and Stalker Creek above the Stalker Creek bridge are **CLOSED** to hunting.
- 8. Dogs are permitted only for retrieving waterfowl. Free ranging dogs are **<u>NOT</u>** permitted.
- 9. Pack out your spent shells and trash. Please be a good steward to the land.
- 10. The Nature Conservancy is not responsible for injuries sustained by any person who uses its land for hunting or recreational purposes.
- 11. Observe all Idaho Fish and Game laws. Officers will be patrolling the preserve. Preserve staff will also be patrolling daily to ensure compliance with preserve regulations.
- 12. Use extreme caution at all times. Remember that other hunters and nonhunters (anglers, canoers, birders, etc.) will be using the Preserve too.
