Site Visit
Warm Springs Mountain Preserve
BUSES DEPART—ENTRANCE TO HOMESTEAD

At 9,000 acres, Warm Springs Mountain Preserve is the largest acquisition to date by The Nature Conservancy in Virginia. Staff from the Conservancy's Virginia Operating Unit will provide an orientation and overview. The site visit will combine a short hike with a drive down the scenic "Homestead Skyline Drive," built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the late 1930s. Weather permitting, we will have a barbecue luncheon. The preserve is a 30-minute drive from The Homestead.

The hike is rated easy to moderate. Weather in late March/April will be cold and crisp.

NOTE: We will offer transportation back to The Homestead at noon for those who inform us in advance of the meeting of their need to depart early.
