

**In only six years, The Mexico REDD+ Program has managed to include and defend the rights of rural women so they can benefit from:**

-  Sex disaggregated data systems and indicators that measure the differentiated impact and influence between women and men.
-  The recognition of women's experience, capacities, and contributions to sustainable forest management.
-  The freedom to participate in decision-making via fair and equal conditions.
-  Access to financial services and gender budgeting.
-  Land tenure and ownership rights.
-  Access to capacity building opportunities.
-  Respect for social safeguards.
-  Equitable distribution of benefits.
-  Participation in decision-making processes.
-  Inclusive language.
-  Equal rights.

We succeeded thanks to the broad participation of women that are managing the forest resources of this country.
