TNC is excited to announce a new streamlined and equitable registration process for our 2026 Legacy Journeys. We invite you to submit your interest in these exciting departures now through Thursday, September 11, 11:59 p.m. ET, using our online Trip Interest Form at nature.org/legacyjourneys.


Instructions

- 1. Legacy Club members looking to travel with TNC in 2026 *must submit a Trip Interest Form*.
- Unlike prior years, the date and time by which you submit your Trip Interest Form will not impact your chance of being assigned to a trip, as long as you do so by the September 11 deadline.
- The Trip Interest Form will allow you to choose up to three trips you would like to participate in and rank them in order of preference.

- 3. After the September 11 deadline, a random selection process will be used to place travelers on trips, taking into account your destination preferences.
- You may be assigned to your second- or third-choice trip if your first choice is already full.
- 4. If all of your chosen and ranked trips are full by the time it is your turn to be assigned to a trip, you will be added to the waitlist for each trip of interest.

Little St. Simons Island












Experience tranquility on the Georgia coast and the spectacular ecological riches found on Little St. Simons Island. The privately owned barrier island is accessible only by boat and has been managed as a nature sanctuary for generations. Its wetlands, woods and shell-strewn coastline beckon exploration by foot and kayak. A prime spot for bird-watching, it offers close-up views of migratory birds feeding in the morning shadows and surf. Whether you paddle through tidal creeks and salt marshes or stroll through maritime forests with moss-draped oaks, you'll be certain to enjoy this incredible retreat.

Highlights

- Hop in a truck for a guided excursion with naturalists who live and work on the island.
- Tuck into a bird blind to observe egrets, wood storks, herons and roseate spoonbills.
- Kayak along tidal creeks surrounded by thousands of acres of protected coastal salt marsh.
- Scan the shores and marshes for shorebirds and American alligators.











Conservation Efforts

Little St. Simons Island lies within the Altamaha River Delta, one of Georgia's most important habitats for thousands of seabirds and shorebirds. The area has long been a focus for TNC's conservation work in the state. Since the 1960s, we have protected a contiguous corridor of more than 50 miles of ecologically important lands within the watershed to bolster the resilience of coastal habitats threatened by increasing development and a changing climate.


Hawai'i












Highlights

- Watch for humpback whales that have migrated from Alaska to breed in the warm waters of the 'Au'au Channel off the coast of Maui.
- Look to the treetops during a visit to Waikamoi Preserve, a rainforest that harbors endemic birds, including the critically endangered 'ākohekohe, or crested honeycreeper, and kiwikiu, or Maui parrotbill, found only on Maui.
- Trek through a landscape shaped by the heat of the Earth at Hawai'i Volcanoes National Park, where you may also observe active eruptions and flowing lava.











Conservation Efforts

In Hawai'i, TNC is conserving lands, waters and local livelihoods in the spirit of mālama 'āina, which means to care for the land so that future generations can thrive and prosper. TNC in Hawai'i's Climate Solutions Fund is supporting nature-based projects in Hawai'i and Palmyra that provide natural protections against the impacts of climate change. Support from the fund has advanced work that includes monitoring the health of native forests, protecting endemic birds, ensuring the safety of researchers at remote locations and building resilience in nearshore waters through reef restoration.

Coastal Texas







Join us for this bird-watcher's dream getaway. Each year, springtime beckons more than 2 billion birds to embark on long flights from Central and South America to northern destinations, such as the Upper Texas Coast. During the first part of our journey, we search for red-cockaded woodpeckers, Bachman's sparrows, fish crows, brown-headed nuthatches and other species at the Big Thicket, an area known for an impressive variety of dragonflies, damselflies and butterflies. Our adventures will also take us through the coastal woodlands of High Island and the rice fields, beaches and wetlands around Galveston Bay.

Highlights

- Explore coastal mottes on the globally celebrated birding hot spot of High Island.
- Learn from TNC experts about conservation work to enhance the Upper Texas Coast's resiliency against storms and climate change through natural infrastructure like oyster reefs.
- Take a ferry to Galveston Island and Bolivar Flats, where marbled godwits, red knots, long-billed dowitchers and other shorebirds feast on a nutrientrich smorgasbord brought in by the tides.











Conservation Efforts

Longleaf pine once blanketed more than 90 million acres across the Southeastern U.S. Today, just 5.2 million acres remain. At its Roy E. Larsen Sandyland Sanctuary—located in the heart of the Big Thicket, a popular destination for bird-watchers—TNC is working with partners to restore longleaf pine woodlands and to protect the open meadows and bald cypress swamps found there. In addition to practicing sustainable forest management on the preserve, TNC is utilizing prescribed burning, which emulates the natural historical disturbance required to maintain a healthy, fire-adapted longleaf pine ecosystem.

Michigan's Upper Peninsula









Dip your toes in sparkling fresh water during a visit to Michigan's Upper Peninsula, which boasts more than 4,000 lakes scattered along rugged coastlines and rock outcroppings, peaceful forests, and complex wetlands that host a vast array of wildlife. On this journey, experience the unparalleled beauty of Lake Superior's shores. Starting in Marquette, explore the coast to its northernmost point, which projects into Lake Superior and carries the moniker of Copper Country to mark its prominence in the nation's first mining boom in the 1800s. From the rocks below to the sky above, this adventure promises to provide insights into places many visitors often miss.

Highlights

- Hike beneath dramatic granite cliff tops at TNC's Echo Lake Nature Preserve.
- Take to the sky on a seaplane with remote, wildlife-filled Isle Royale National Park as your destination.
- Set out on a kayaking adventure to explore the sandy beaches and wetlands along Lake Superior.











Conservation Efforts

Sustainably managed for decades as a healthy, mature working forest, Slate River Forest—with towering hemlock trees and free-flowing rivers—is rich, diverse and stunningly beautiful. TNC's science has found that this area ranks among the most resilient lands in Michigan, meaning it can sustain natural diversity in the face of a changing climate. That's why after establishing it as a working forest reserve, TNC is continuing good stewardship practices there that will help sequester carbon and sustain its vitality and diversity.

Europe's Western Balkans










Water leads the way in the Western Balkans. During this debut Legacy Journey to Croatia and over the border into Bosnia and Herzegovina, we'll explore scenic countrysides and quaint towns that are largely a secret to the rest of the world. Hear from TNC experts working on the ground to protect the region's most ecologically significant natural landscapes and some of Europe's last free-flowing rivers. From waterfalls to underground streams and vast wetlands, you'll learn about environmental challenges and opportunities, as well as the ways that TNC can play a role in safeguarding these global hot spots for unique plants and animals.

Highlights

- Float along the sparkling Kupa River in a traditional Žitna lađa boat to enjoy a unique perspective of Croatia's forests, monasteries and local wildlife.
- Venture into Plitvice Lakes National Park to see unique tufa formations of hollow, porous rock that, over millennia, have created natural barriers to form the park's globally significant system of lakes.
- Immerse yourself in the natural beauty and cultural heritage of the Japod Valley as you explore its cascading waterfalls and medieval fortresses.











Conservation Efforts

The Nature Conservancy has teamed up with six local partners through United for Rivers to support communityled efforts to conserve 400 kilometers of rivers across southeastern Europe's Western Balkans by 2030. The region is home to some of the continent's remaining free-flowing rivers, which are threatened by proposed dams and pollution. In 2024, the initiative helped to secure legal protection for the Mrežnica and Touničica rivers in Croatia. This work will safeguard the ecological, social and cultural values of these freshwater ecosystems for generations.

East Tennessee









Highlights

- Visit Shady Valley to see globally rare peat wetlands, plants and animals and an unusual, naturally occurring cranberry bog.
- Explore trails and overlooks on side-by-side vehicles and partake in a picnic with a view at Doe Mountain Recreation Area.
- Spend time in Great Smoky Mountains National Park to hike and learn about how fire benefits nature in the Southern Appalachians.











Conservation Efforts

Every 10 years, Tennessee's State Wildlife Action Plan (SWAP) is revised to incorporate innovative approaches and adapt to changing conditions. SWAP is a cornerstone of the state's conservation efforts and serves as a guide to protect and manage wildlife, fish and plant species and their habitats. TNC, state and federal agencies, and more than 20 other organizations have united in a steering committee to develop an evolving strategy that will increase the capacity for progress in prioritized habitats from the Mississippi River to the Blue Ridge Mountains.

Is a Journey Right for You?

When considering whether a trip is right for you, review the itinerary and activities involved. Travelers should be able to walk as many as 3 miles over uneven terrain with some elevation gain per day. Some trips may include activities such as boating, snorkeling or swimming. Expect to be outdoors for four to eight hours on most days. A range of weather conditions is possible during each trip. If you do not wish to participate in an activity, discuss this with the tour operator prior to the trip, and, if possible, accommodations will be made.
